

# CHRISTMAS DRILL IS HELD BY GREYS

## Knickerbocker Cadets Give Review for Veterans at the 107th Regiment Armory

## MUSIC CORPS HAS DEBUT

## New Unit Makes Its Formal Appearance — Forty-one Boys Are Promoted

More than 2,000 relatives and guests, including many veterans of the unit, saw the Knickerbocker Greys, junior cadet military organization, hold its annual Christmas drill yesterday at the 107th (Seventh) Regiment Armory, Sixty-sixth Street and Park Avenue.

The drill also was the first formal affair participated in by the Knickerbocker Greys Field Music, organized this Fall under the auspices of the veterans' association, and the newly formed exhibition company of officers and non-commissioned officers of the Greys. Both units received hearty applause.

The 200 boys in the Greys, in their traditional gray and white uniforms, also gave a review in honor of about fifty members of the Knickerbocker Greys Veterans Association, headed by Herbert S. Whitman, its president.

The evening parade, the high point of the drill, according to custom, was in honor of the retiring cadet colonel, Lowel Thomas Jr., who has been appointed cadet commandant to assist Lieutenant Warrick.
