

MRS. A. BELMONT JR. TO WED J. D. WING

Albert V. de Goicouria of Havana Announces His Daughter's Engagement.

SHE IS BANKER'S WIDOW

Her Fiance, a Stock Broker, Served With the U. S. Army as an Officer in the War.

Albert V. de Goicouria has announced the engagement of his daughter, Mrs. August Belmont Jr., to John D. Wing 2d of 52 East Fifty-fourth Street, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Morgan Wing of Sandanona, Millbrook, N. Y., and grandson of the late John D. Wing.

Mrs. Belmont was formerly Miss Alice W. de Goicouria. Her husband, August Belmont Jr., died in the Winter of 1919. He was a son of August Belmont and a partner in the international banking house of August Belmont & Co. The de Goicourias are members of the old Spanish family of that name. Mr. de Goicouria, who was a member of the New York Stock Exchange, has retired from active business and is now living in Havana, Cuba.

During the war Mr. Wing was in the Norton Harjes volunteer ambulance corps with the French and afterward served with the United States Army as an officer in the remount service. He is now a stock broker, but until their consolidation with the Allied Chemical and Dye Corporation in 1921 Mr. Wing was a director and an officer in the firm of Wing & Evans, of which his family had been the founders. This was one of the oldest merchant firms in New York.

No date has been set for the wedding.

The Greys have long been known as Colonel Daniel Appleton's little "Grey Jackets" and have been drilled by successive Colonels from Colonel Appleton to Colonel Wade Hampton Hayes of today.
